The story then travells of introduction of other characters such as Gautham, Shwetha's husband and Bobby his brother who happens to be a drug addict. It is also shown that almost everyone says that Shwetha is not in a good frame of mind and belives that she has a daughter of five years. Sathya comes across a CCTV footage of the kidnapping and is preplexed that Ria is not to be found in the footage and ponders over Shwetha's state of mind. Even as he is looking at the markings of a child' height mrkings on a wall, Shwetha comitts suicide by falling off the railing of her apaprtment.

Sathya meets Anuya at her farmhouse where Ria is hidden.





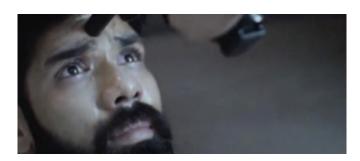
